A reflection on this week's readings

From the readings for Sunday 3rd November

Isaiah 25:7-9

And in this mountain the Lord of hosts ... will destroy the face of the covering cast over all people, and the vail that is spread over all nations. He will swallow up death in victory and the Lord God will wipe away tears from off all faces; and the rebuke of his people shall he take away from off all the earth: for the Lord hath spoken it. And it shall be said in that day, Lo, this is our God; we have waited for him, and he will save us: this is the Lord; we have waited for him, we will be glad and rejoice in his salvation.

AV (King James Bible)

On this mountain the Lord of hosts ... will destroy the covering that is cast over all peoples, the veil that is spread over all nations. He will swallow up death for ever, and the Lord God will wipe away tears from all faces, and the reproach of his people he will take away from all the earth; for the Lord has spoken. It will be said on that day, "Lo, this is our God; we have waited for him, that he might save us. This is the Lord; we have waited for him; let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation."

Here on Mount Zion the Lord Almighty ... will suddenly remove the cloud of sorrow that has been hanging over all the nations. The Sovereign Lord will destroy death forever! He will wipe away the tears from everyone's eyes and take away the disgrace his people have suffered throughout the world. The Lord himself has spoken. When it happens, everyone will say, "He is our God! We have put our trust in him, and he has rescued us. He is the Lord! We have put our trust in him, and now we are happy and joyful because he has saved us."

Good News Bible

But here on this mountain, God-of-the-Angel-Armies ...will banish the pall of doom hanging over all peoples, the shadow of doom darkening all nations. Yes, he'll banish death forever. And God will wipe the tears from every face. He'll remove every sign of disgrace from his people, wherever they are. Yes! God says so! Also at that time, people will say, "Look at what's happened! This is our God! We waited for him and he showed up and saved us!"

The core of the first part of the book of Isaiah (chaps. I-39) is a series of prophecies by the historical prophet Isaiah of Jerusalem, who lived in the 8th century BC. These relate to the dangers posed to the kingdom of Judah by the rise of Assyrian power, and focus on the need to trust in God and to live justly. But they have been arranged, commented on and put in context by later editors, and some of the material even in these chapters seems to be much later. Today's reading is a case in point.

In chapter 25 the focus shifts from the immediate threats and warnings to the broader trust we have that God is ultimately in control of events and that "in all things, our good is his desire and his gift". It's as though the camera zooms out to take in the broad cosmic picture – what is God's ultimate purpose for us, his creation? The text makes it clear that this is a promise not only for the Jewish people but for "all nations" – an emphasis that we also find in the work of "Second Isaiah", the probable author of chaps.40-55. It focuses on the end of history and what lies beyond it – that God's will for his creation is life in all its fulness, not death. But at the same time, by placing it here amid the historical struggles and concerns of the Jewish people in an earlier time, the editor of the text is pointing out to us that God's ultimate cosmic purpose for humanity arises out of, and is of a piece with, his concern for justice in the here and now.

Not surprisingly, these are themes that resonated strongly with the early church, just as they still do today. We can find close verbal echoes of this passage in St Paul: "Death has been swallowed up in victory" (I Cor 15:54) and in Revelation: "He will wipe every tear from their eyes" (Rev 21:4).

Lord, you know it can be hard for us to hold on to this ultimate confidence amid the travails of our world and the struggles in our own lives. Help us to trust gratefully that our good really is your desire and your gift.
