VOLUNTEERS NEEDED TO COOK FOR NIGHT SHELTER

We help to run the Forest Churches Night Shelter throughout the winter months. Starting on the 1st November and running through to the start of April, the shelter provides beds and warm meals for homeless people in north-east London. You might recall that in the old days we used to run this from the parish halls, but now it is all run in conjunction with the YMCA on Forest Road, Walthamstow. This enables service users to have a proper bed and a shower, as well as an evening meal, and means people don't have to pack up their belongings every night to travel to a new church hall the next day. Wanstead volunteers' night at the shelter is Tuesdays. The volunteers cook a meal at home for about 15 people, and then take it along to the shelter in Walthamstow, serve it up and eat with the service users. Afterwards, the volunteers clear up and chat or play some board games with the service users. Volunteers are always paired-up and a professional member of staff is on hand at all times to assist. You don't need to stay overnight. The meal is usually served about 6.45pm and the shift is over by 9.30pm. People who volunteered last year really enjoyed the experience and the interactions they had, and we were all on the rota only about five times throughout the winter, so it wasn't arduous. He taught his disciples, and said unto them, The Son of man is delivered into the hands of men, and they shall kill him; and after that he is killed, he shall rise the third day. But they understood not that saying, and were afraid to ask him. And he came to Capernaum: and being in the house he asked them, What was it that ye disputed among yourselves by the way? But they held their peace: for by the way they had disputed among themselves, who should be the greatest.

He was teaching his disciples, saying to them, "The Son of man will be delivered into the hands of men, and they will kill him; and when he is killed, after three days he will rise." But they were silent; for on the way they had discussed with one another who was the greatest.

He was teaching his disciples that the Son of Man would be betrayed into the power of men, that they would kill him and that three days after his death he would rise again. But they were completely mystified by this saying, and were afraid to question him about it. So they came to Capernaum. And when they were indoors he asked them, "What were you discussing as we came along?" They were silent, for on the way they had been arguing about who should be the greatest.

He told them, "The Son of Man is about to be betrayed to some people who want nothing to do with God. They will murder him. Three days after his murder, he will rise, alive." They didn't know what he was talking about, but were afraid to ask him about it. They came to Capernaum. When he was safe at home, he asked them, "What were you discussing on the road?" The silence was deafening—they had been arguing with one another over who among them was greatest.

The Message

Do you remember last week's gospel reading, in which Jesus explained that it was necessary for him to suffer and die, and be resurrected? Peter couldn't accept this, and Jesus rebuked him harshly. He then made a point of "summoning the crowd" before challenging them (and us) to take up their/our crosses and follow him. Since then we've had the Transfiguration, but the disciples still seem to be stuck in the same place. (To be fair, most of them hadn't been up there on the mountain with Peter and James and John.) Now once again Jesus is withdrawing from public view, concentrating on trying to explain once again to the disciples what Peter had failed to grasp.

And they spectacularly don't get it. Something (fear of knowing the truth?) prevents them from engaging, from asking Jesus to explain. And to underline their not getting it, they start bickering about who'll get the top roles when Jesus, their Messiah, comes into his own. Many have wondered why Mark seems so determined to portray the disciples as – well, if not stupid exactly, at least regularly failing to rise to the occasion, to understand the mind-blowing, revolutionary novelty of a resurrection perspective, how that changes everything. Rowan Williams suggests that this is not to make us feel superior to the disciples, but to comfort and reassure us when we regularly fail to "get it" in our own lives.

So Jesus carefully explains that in a resurrection perspective to lead is to serve, so leadership needs to look very different. We're so used to that image of Jesus taking a little child that we can easily forget how shockingly counter-cultural it must have been at that time to equate the child, not just with himself but with God the Father. Pope Gregory the Great (590-604), one of the dominant saintly figures in the early mediaeval church, famously described himself as "the servant of the servants of God".

Lord Jesus, help us never to lose sight of the way your resurrection has turned the world upside down, and help us to live our lives in the light of that revelation.
